

California United Church of Christ September 12, 2022 – Consistory Meeting Highlights

The California UCC Consistory met for its regular monthly meeting Sept 12, 2022. Pastor Cobb opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of the August 2022 meeting, Congregational Meeting Minutes on August 28, Treasurer's Report, Financial Secretary's Report, Stewardship Snapshot and Local Benevolence Report were reviewed and approved.

Reports and updates were given by committees and organizations. Evangelism continues working on t-shirt designs. Worship Committee met and named a chair, Lisa Milligan and secretary Mary Beth Deeken. The Committee asked for the backdrop for family photos on special Sundays to be set up on piano side in order to keep the banner viewable. Worship committee is asking for greeters/ushers to hand bulletins out to guests or those who miss picking them up. Advent and poinsettia plans are in place. Dec 25th service time is being reviewed, need to verify with Salem before it is finalized. Memorial, Stewardship, and Schnuck Endowment have nothing to report.

Building and Grounds updates-

Front Doors: hardware is fixed, stain is still not looking great. They will fix with a gel stain this fall.

Andy replaced the burnt-out light on east clock face.

Brady's made paper template of the windows last Friday with Imhoff's lift. There is a 8-10 week lag to get the windows made—looking for replacement in Dec/Jan. We will need to coordinate with Imhoff to get the plexiglass removed and the windows painted, caulked, and window glazing replaced to ensure we do not have to take the window off for quite some time. This is outside of the original painting bid so it will be an additional cost, but should be under \$5,000.

Imhoff finished the painting and plaster job on Wed. Sept 7th. Issues will be addressed (just a couple spots to finish up).

California construction bill for \$145 for storm window replacement.

Boiler install is in progress, but the boiler has not arrived. Estimated install in October.

Landscape design reviewed, committee to be formed to do the work on the flower bed. VanDee Miller moved to approve a budget up to \$4500 for the flower bed in front of the building. Seconded by Alan Chambers. Motion Carried. Gym RTU install in October.

Brotherhood and Women's Guild continue to meet with good discussions and studies. Sunday School has started a study on Revelation and some will finish "The Story". Youth group is successfully meeting during Sunday school with some additional get togethers outside of church. Pumpkin Carving planned soon.

Wednesday Night Meals – Coordinator- Judy Burger, Thank you to Judy! Permission given to Letha to utilize the Sam's Card to offset increased food prices.

Andy requested that we start to plan for annual meeting regarding increasing the cost limit for the consistory from \$5,000 to \$15,000.

New Business:

Church Mutual (building insurance) raised rates to nearly \$500/quarter—seemingly subject to the roof claim.

Nursery Project: Betty Cobb, Ronda Mortenson. Plan and bid made to revamp the nursery with volunteers and a small budget was presented. Motion to approve the plan with a budget of up to \$2500 made by Ronnie Kissick, seconded by Alan Chambers. Motion Carried. Big thank you to Ronda Mortenson for heading up this project!

Second Elevator- A member has commented to a couple of consistory members that there may be a need for an additional elevator in our church. The cost would be very high, however, there was discussion on a chair lift added to the wide stairs closest to the current elevator.

<u>Special Benevolence— October</u>

The Salvation Army of Jefferson City, Missouri

The benevolence offering for the month of October is the Salvation Army Center of Hope. The Center of Hope is an emergency shelter for homeless men, women, and parents with children. It is the only shelter in the Jefferson City area that accommodates and can house all these groups, including veterans and senior citizens.

The Center of Hope Emergency Shelter provides social services that include a food pantry, clothing vouchers for the Salvation Army Thrift Store, Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners, Christmas assistance for food and toys for families, Christmas and Easter gifts for nursing home residents. Additional services available to help the homeless or near-homeless are the Pathway for Hope Program, rent and utility assistance and a permanent housing program. There are services specifically for children, such as free scouting programs, summer camps, kids choir and Christmas Kids.

The Salvation Army Corps provides Sunday School for all ages on Sunday at 10:00 a.m. and regular worship service on Sunday at 11:00 a.m. Please prayerfully consider giving to this worthy Christian cause.





UCC Brotherhood Minutes - Monday, September 26, 2022

Refreshments – The meeting began with a delicious light meal provided by Dave and Rhonda Meyer.

Program - The program for the evening was provided by Bailey McGill, Registered Nurse with the Moniteau County Health Department. Bailey is one of a staff of eight persons employed by the health department, located on Francis Street here in California. She provided information on the range of services offered at the department. They offer the WIC (women, infants, children) program, various screenings, injections, a well-child clinic, adult wellness clinics, testing programs, health education classes as well as numerous other services. They also offer wellness labs for \$5 each, including CBC (complete blood count), CMP (comprehensive metabolic panel), TSH (thyroid stimulating hormone), PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen), and Hemoglobin A1C – all available without a doctor's order. Bailey noted that this the time of year for getting a flu vaccination and they also have the most recent covid booster available. The covid booster is offered in the clinic on Friday's only, but both vaccinations will be offered in several drive-up clinics this fall. It is permissible to get both the flu vaccination and covid booster at the same time if desired. The health department has home covid test kits available upon request. Bailey noted that there has been one case of monkey pox in Moniteau County. The health department communicates with schools in the county on a weekly basis to monitor flu and other illnesses throughout She also shared that hospitalizations due to covid have dropped dramatically in recent months. The health department is funded with a mix of county, state and federal funds.

Business Meeting — Abe called the meeting to order with approximately 21 members in attendance. The minutes of the August meeting were read and approved. The treasurer's report was approved with a current balance of \$2491.35. Tony mentioned that we have bills for fish and the prisoner meal pending. He noted that the Women's Guild provided two noon meals for the prison project at no cost to the Brotherhood. Abe took a count of 22 members and guests that will be attending the meal at Central UCC church on Tuesday, October 4. He thanked everyone who helped make this year's prison project a great success.

Devotion – Dave Meyer provided a thoughtful devotion based on Leviticus 23:22 "And when you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap your field to its very border, nor shall you gather the gleanings after your harvest; you shall leave them for the poor and for the stranger: I am the Lord your God." Dave noted that even though in today's world, people in need aren't in the habit of walking through crop fields picking up grain leavings, we need to be mindful of the needs of folks less fortunate and provide of our excess as to their needs. The devotion concluded with the singing of "What a Friend We Have in Jesus."

Western Association of the Missouri Mid-South Conference

Our church is a member of the Western Association (WA) of the Missouri Mid-South Conference, United Church of Christ. We are one of 43 congregations. Churches in this area are grouped into four clusters: Kansas City/St. Joseph; Lafayette; Central; and Ozark clusters. Cluster churches often cooperate in special worship celebrations and ministry opportunities.

We currently have two conference delegates (Carla Clennin and Larry Rohrbach) and Rev. Russell Cobb who attend quarterly meetings for the WA and yearly Conference Annual Gathering (CAG) as voting delegate(s). Each of the four clusters has a representative who attends monthly WA Council meetings. Carla is in her second year of three year term as the Central Cluster representatives for churches in central area. These churches are from Billings, Boonville, California, Columbia, Hartsburg, Jefferson City, McGirk, New Franklin, and Sedalia. We gather the second Tuesday each month either in Columbia or Jefferson City for lunch. Carla will then present what was discussed at our luncheons to the WA Council that meets the third Tuesday of each month by zoom.

Saturday, October 15 our church will be hosting the WA Fall Meeting from 10 am – 3 pm. This meeting will be hybrid, meaning congregations can attend in-person or via zoom. The Devotional will be led by Dr. Lisa Davison, Professor of Hebrew Bible at Phillips Theological Seminary in Tulsa, OK speaking on "Pursuing Justice & Equity". Our own Women's Guild will be serving the lunch.



Conference Annual Gathering 2022 will be held October 27-29 at the Capital Plaza Hotel in Jefferson City.

Would you want to get more involved in the Missouri Mid-South conference or the Western Association? Volunteer positions are now open for Moderator and Vice Moderator for the WA.

The "mission statements" are particularly useful as a tool for Association leadership as they seek to nominate one member to each Team and Committee – six people from each Association, both clergy and lay. 
