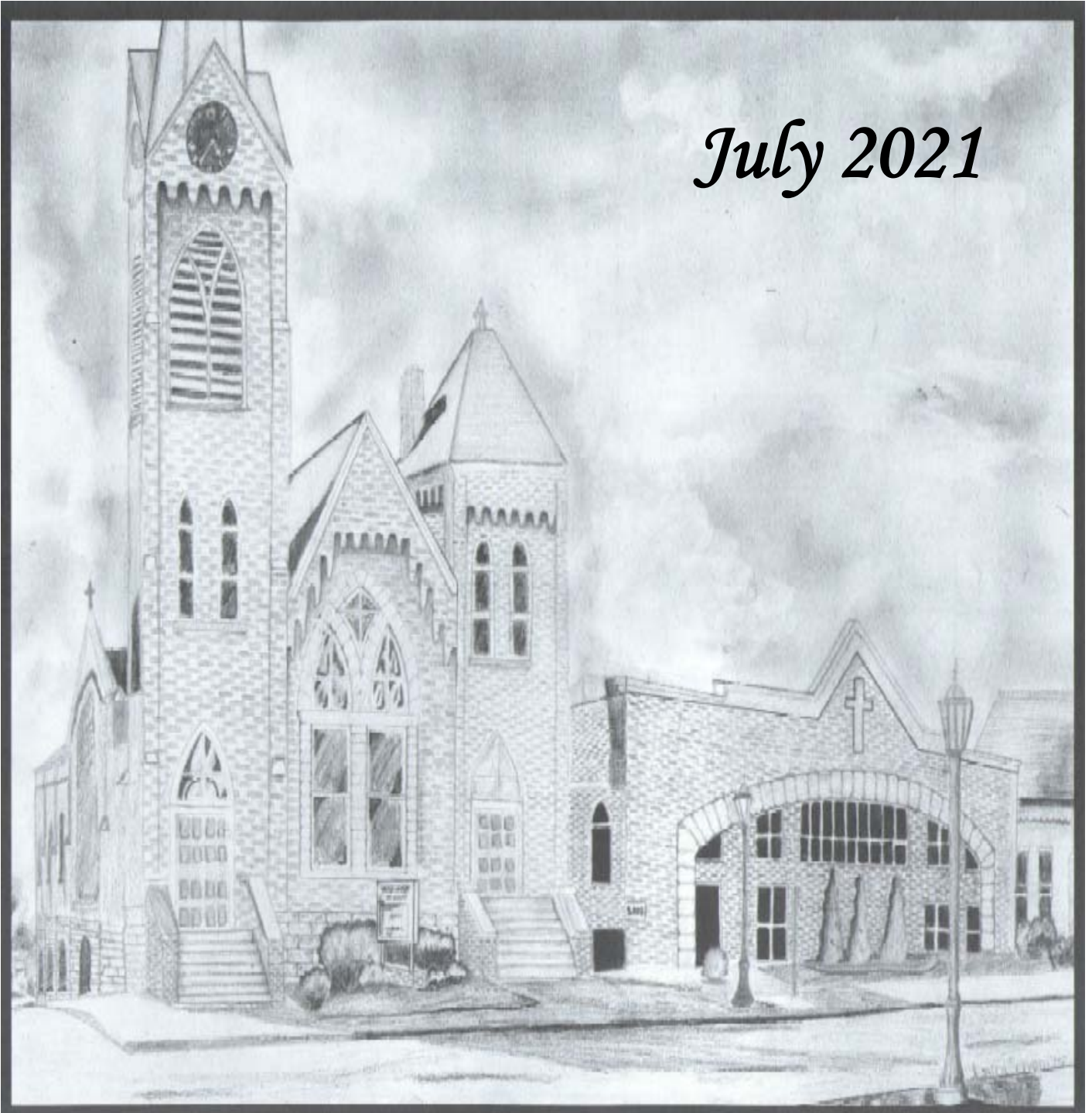

From the Pastor's Desk ~

.Living a Worthy Life

“For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you. We continually ask God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all the wisdom and understanding that the Spirit gives, so that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God,”

Colossians 1:9-10

We continue our look at the last chapter of each one of Paul's letters this month. I encourage you to read the letters to the Galatians, Ephesians, Philip-pians, and Colossians during the month of July. They are short letters. You can read a chapter a day and easily finish them up in a month. I love the above verses from Colossians. Paul and his companions were continually praying not for the physical well-being of the Colossian believers but for their spiritual well-being. June 14, 2021 – Consistory Meeting Highlights

The California UCC Consistory met for its regular monthly meeting June 14, 2021. Pastor Cobb opened the meeting with prayer.

Minutes of the May 10, 2021 meeting, Treasurer's Report, Financial Secretary's Report, Stewardship Snapshot and Local Benevolence Report were reviewed and approved.

Reports and updates were given by committees and organizations. The Evangelism Committee will be handing out Father's Day gifts and plan to participate in the July 4th parade. Building & Grounds – Andy Burger reported on several ongoing projects. He met with Dutcher's Paint to get a quote on replacing the carpet in the upstairs sitting area which is stained and sun faded. The carpet is also wrinkling at the north end of the hallway. The same carpet isn't available and it can't be stretched. After discussion it was decided to replace with carpet in the sitting area and the hallway. Andy will go back to Dutcher's for a quote for the complete project. He also met with Brady's Glass to get a quote for storm windows for the stained glass sanctuary windows. It will mostly likely be expensive since they will have to be custom made. He mentioned the possibility of seeing if there are grants available for this type of project due to the age and history of our church building. He has also talked with Brian Stahl re: the replacement/repair of the front entry doors. The concrete just outside the downstairs foyer is in need of repair. Andy will follow-up on this to obtain a quote. The Stewardship Committee discussed the building needs list. Due to the many expensive maintenance projects needed they discussed a capital campaign to raise the funds. The Committee asked for and received guidance and approval to proceed with this campaign. Women's Guild continues to study miracles of the Bible. Sunday School has started 'The Story'. Youth Group gathered the end of May and will be floating in June.

Special Benevolence— July

RAPE & ABUSE CRISIS SERVICE (RACS)

The special benevolent mission project for July is the Rape and Abuse Crisis Service (RACS). RACS is a non-shelter, social service agency providing crisis intervention, advocacy, support and education/prevention services to victims/survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence and stalking. **RACS** began its mission in early 1980 by establishing a 24-hour crisis hotline to offer emotional support and referral information to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. Nine central Missouri counties are served by RACS including Cole, Gasconade, Maries, Miller, Moniteau, Morgan, Osage, Southern Boone and Southern Callaway. The agency continues to evaluate the services provided in order to more effectively address victims' needs. Services have gradually expanded as needs and funding for this not-for-profit agency have increased. The services they provide are free of charge to people who have been victims. They also provide education and prevention programs to end personal violence in our society. Providing victims with the opportunity to regain confidence, control and direction in their lives helps keep this community strong. Please give to the important mission in the attached envelope.

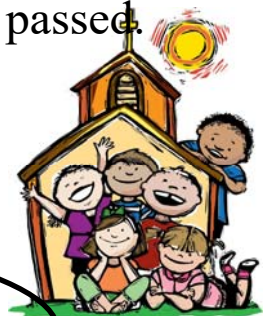

**Sunday School is in the Ministry
of Transforming Lives**

UCC Women's Guild

June 16, 2021

The Women's Guild met on June 16, 2021, in the Fellowship Hall with 11 ladies present. President Linda Schnieders called the meeting to order at 1:05 p.m.

Carol Barbour led our Bible Study on Jesus' Miracles and Ours. The Bible verse for our first miracle; Healing on the Sabbath – Luke 6:6-11. It was the Sabbath, and Jesus was teaching in the Synagogue with the Scribes, and Pharisees watching. Jesus posed the question, “...is it legal to do good on the Sabbath day or do evil? To save a life or to destroy it?” Jesus then healed a man’s right withered hand by asking the man to stretch out his hand, and it was healed. Barclay calls what Jesus did on this Sabbath an act of defiance. Or it could also be called an act of obedience to God.

The second miracle studied is a Life Restored in Nain – Luke 7:11-17. On his way to Nain, Jesus and his disciples encountered a funeral procession. The man who died was a mother’s only son and she was a widow. Jesus was moved to the depths of his heart for the widow and touched the bier. Those who were carrying the bier stood still, and Jesus said, “Young man, I tell you rise.” And he gave the young man back to his mother. All who were there, glorified God by saying a great prophet has risen amongst us.

The third miracle studied is Jesus Calms the Storm – Luke 8:22-25. One vday Jesus and his disciples left on a ship on the Sea of Galilee. “Let’s go to the other side of the lake.” So, they set sail, and Jesus fell asleep. A violent squall came, and the boat began to fill with water, and they were in danger. They woke Jesus, and he rebuked the wind and the surf of the water. The water calmed, and Jesus rebuked the disciples saying, “Where is your faith?” But the disciples were awe stricken and amazed. Jesus calms the storms of all kinds in our lives if we have faith.

We studied a fourth miracle, the Demons and Pigs – Luke 8:26-39. Jesus and the disciples’ took a voyage to the district of Gerasenes, across the lake from Galilee. When Jesus disembarked on the land there, he met a man from the town who had demons. Jesus cast the demons out into the pigs who then rushed into the lake and drowned. The people from town came out, and saw what Jesus had done, and were afraid. They asked him to leave. Jesus then embarked on the ship and went away. The man from whom the demons had gone out begged to be allowed to go with him; but Jesus sent him away telling him to go home, and tell the story of all God had done for him.

Carole also shared a miracle of three bibles saved by firefighters in a trailer fire where the trailer and everything else in it was destroyed.

Mary Keil shared the Thought for the Day, a poem; new friends we treasure, but old friends are the salt of the earth.

The mission we support for June is the California Ministerial Alliance. The church's benevolence is the Pilgrim UCC Soup Kitchen, and the Sunday School's is the Central Missouri Foster Care and Adoption. We are encouraged to support these benevolence offerings.

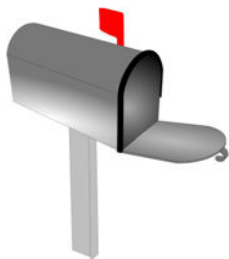

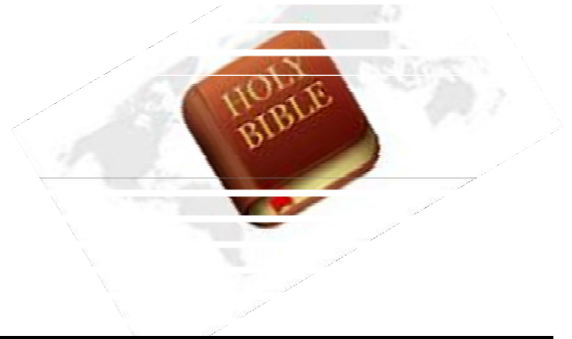
