Moniteau Christian Ministries Center is both the Cargill Cares Food Pantry & the Project Share Thrift Shop in one building located at 303 Latham Road. MCMC has been serving Moniteau County for the last 16 years and would welcome anyone who has not seen the Thrift Shop (open Thursday, Friday, from 10 am to 3:30 & Saturday 10 to 2:00) to stop by to see the many & varied items for sale.

The Cargill Cares Food Pantry is open from 3-5 pm on the first, second, & third Thursday & Friday of each month and from 9-11 am on the third Saturday. Food items distributed are received from the Central Missouri Food Bank, local donations, food drives, & other supporting entities. If anyone is needing food, please come to the food bank on distribution days or contact Barb Mannering (573-291-4405) in an emergency or also to help with distribution. THE CARGILL CARES FOOD PANTRY serves an average of 300 families each month.

PROJECT SHARE'S Thrift Shop provides free clothing monthly to those requesting clothing assistance.

Project Share's income provides monies to the food bank, pays utilities, insurance and numerous other expenses to maintain the MCMC facility.

A benevolent activity that Project Share has undertaken is a prison ministry where an inmate may request needed items (1-pant, 1-shirt, & 1-coat). Hopefully items will be available off the racks

The Cargill Cares pantry has their "Buddy Pack" program which runs during the school year. If you are interested in volunteering, please contact Barb Mannering at 573-291-4405. This could be to help with the buddy packs, preparing food for distribution, or in the actual distribution of food.

Project Share is also in need of volunteers to prepare the donated clothing, etc to stock their thrift store. This activity takes place every Monday & Tuesday from 10 am until around 5 pm or as many hours as you wish to help. For this activity contact Judy Barbour (573-230-2316). We distribute food to 7,500 children through the Buddy Pack Program each week during the school year at more than 150 schools in our 32-county service area.

#### **New/other Business:**


It is time to start looking for a new officer for the upcoming year. A few names were tossed around. Laura tabled the process due to low attendance.


Lanny has been notified that Kerri Tuttle would like to be added to the substitute teacher list. Carla will work with Renee' to get contact information.

#### UCC Women's Guild ~ July 21, 2021

The Women's Guild met on July 21, 2021, in the Fellowship Hall with 11 ladies present. New members Carmen Ferris and Carmen Brown joined us today. President Linda Schnieders called the meeting to order at 1:02 p.m.

Carole Barbour led our Bible Study on Jesus' Miracles and Ours. The Bible verse for our first miracle; A Crowd and a Woman – Mark 5:24b-34. Jesus is on his way to deal with a life and death situation, and a large crowd followed him. A woman had a bleeding disease; she came up behind Jesus, touching his cloak, believing she would be healed. Immediately her bleeding stopped, and she was free of suffering. Jesus realized power had gone out of him and asked, "Who touched me?" The woman identified herself, and Jesus said, "Daughter, your faith has healed. Go in peace and be freed from your suffering."

The second miracle studied is Jairus' Daughter – Luke 8:40-42 and 49-56. Jairus, a ruler of the synagogue, came and fell at Jesus' feet, pleading with him to go to his house because his only daughter, a girl of about twelve, was dying. Then someone came from Jairus' house and told Jairus his daughter was dead and not to bother the teacher anymore. Hearing this, Jesus told Jairus not to be afraid, just believe, and she will be healed. Jesus visited Jairus' house, and the people there were wailing. Jesus told them to stop wailing, as the daughter was asleep and not dead. The people laughed at Jesus as they believed she was dead. Jesus took the daughter by the hand and told her to get up. Her spirit returned, and she stood up at once. Jesus told them to give her something to eat. He asked Jairus and the people not to tell anyone what happened.

The third miracle studied is Two Blind – Matthew – 9:27-31. As Jesus went from Jairus' house, two blind men followed him and called out, "Have mercy on us, Son of David!" Once Jesus went indoors, the blind men came to him, and he asked them if they believed he was able to heal them. They said, "Yes, Lord." Jesus then touched their eyes and said, "According to your faith, it will be done to you." Their sight was restored, and Jesus sternly warned them to tell no one. But they went out and spread the news about Jesus all over the region.

We studied a fourth miracle, A Gift of Speech – Matthew 9:32-34. A man demon possessed and who could not talk was brought to Jesus. This occurred after he healed the two blind men. When Jesus drove out the demon, the man who had been mute could speak. The crowd was amazed and were saying, "Nothing like this has ever been seen in Israel.. But the Pharisees said, "It is by the power of demons that he drives out demons." Carole also shared a miracle of a Nativity scene that survived a disaster.

Linda shared the "Thought for the Day" for Mary Burger, who could not attend. She read a poem by Dr. Heartstill Wilson, "A New Day", that she has had posted by her desk for many years. The poem shares the way to approach the day for success and or failure. Your choices and the attitude you chose to embrace the day can make a difference in your day.

The mission we support for July is the Halo House. The church's benevolence is the Rape and Abuse Crisis Service, and the Sunday School's is the Central Missouri Food Bank. We are encouraged to support these benevolence offerings. The offering was received.

#### **Business Meeting**

Several people who have received the cards have called to say how much they look forward to and appreciate receiving the cards.

There is no correspondence this month. We approved having Andrea Lutz clean the kitchen stove at \$150 and Brian Rolling cleaning the chairs at \$3 a chair for our August Cleaning meeting. We will support Sharefest by providing personal hygiene packs, family food boxes, and paper product packs. #### UCC Men's Brotherhood – UCC Brotherhood Minutes – Monday, July 26, 2021

**Refreshments** – The meeting began at 7:00 p.m. with a light meal and refreshments served by Norman & Joyce Rohrbach.

**Business Meeting** – Abe Rohrbach called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. The minutes of the June meeting were read and approved. The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$1,273.71 after recent gifts and donations and was approved. Abe asked for discussion on our trial meeting schedule of starting at 7:00 p.m. with a light meal and refreshments followed by the devotion, program and business meeting and whether we should continue with this arrangement. Following a brief discussion, the group voted to continue with the revised schedule. Tony Barry agreed to coordinate the fish and potato frying for our August fish fry scheduled for Monday, August 23 at 6:30 p.m. The program committee will coordinate the program for the event. The men from Central church in Jefferson City have been invited to attend along with their families. The consistory has asked the Brotherhood to take care of keeping the church parking lots clean and neat. The Brotherhood agreed to coordinate this task under the leadership of Steven Burger. Meeting adjourned.

**Program** – Paul Fennewald introduced Sam Shelton to share the program for the evening. Sam shared his life's story as a member of the Amish community in Moniteau County. He was born in an Amish community in Ohio. He started working with horses when he was 8 years old and has extensive experience in training and working with horses and mules. He and his family now live in an Amish community in the north part of Moniteau County. There are approximately 40 families in the county at this time.

They are a very conservative group and rely on a simple lifestyle, hard work and religious faith. He pointed out that Amish is not a religion, it is a lifestyle. They are Christians by faith. Some of the principles Sam mentioned that they live by are as follows –

They rely heavily on the 10 commandments to guide their daily lives.

The life they live should be a reflection of their Christian faith.

One of their main goals is to preserve a strong work ethic among all ages.

If you want something, you work for it.

They try not to become dependent on technology and earthly conveniences that take away from their values.

Sam shared a good bit of Anabaptist history from the time of Martin Luther forward. He pointed out that their people have endured much religious persecution through time. The reason his ancestors emigrated to America was for religious freedom. Here in the county, they have about 20 families as part of each church group. They take turns meeting in member's homes each week. Their services are spoken in German. He discussed differences between the Amish and Mennonite communities and noted that their Amish community is one of the most conservative in existence anywhere.


