September 13, 2021 – Consistory Meeting Highlights

The California UCC Consistory met for its regular monthly meeting September 13, 2021. Pastor Cobb opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of the August 2021 meeting, Treasurer's Report, Financial Secretary's Report, Stewardship Snapshot and Local Benevolence Report were reviewed and approved.

Minutes from September 12, 2021, congregational meeting reviewed and approved with corrections.

Reports and updates were given by committees and organizations. Evangelism planning coverage for fall/winter weddings, looking at new shirts for the church, planning another New Members Luncheon-more information to come. Historical committee: smart plug installed for lighting in display cabinet, nothing further to report. Memorial-approved payment for carpeting in upper hallway and picked matching sample. Building and Grounds several suggestions were given to consistory members on building and grounds needs; each were discussed and recorded. "workday/ month of giving" list and details to be posted soon. Several small fixes done around the church by Andy, still waiting for quotes on several jobs. We are asking for floor maintenance in gym-recommendations for best servicing to maintain over time. Safe Churchexit sign fixed by library; childproof covers replaced on outlets. Worship- nothing new to report. Brotherhood and Women's Guild continue with monthly meetings. Sunday school continues to plan picnic for Oct 10th. Youth Group scheduling regularly scheduled meetings for the fall. Youth Sunday was completed and very much appreciated, great job by everyone.

Communion, format discussed: plan is to pass communion with toothpicks in the bread but also have individual servings available in the back. next communion date 10/3/21. Plaque for Fellowship Hall- ordered, awaiting arrival to decide on placement. Capital Campaign approved to run through August 31, 2022. Also approved, were the following projects: 2 AC units, sanctuary drywall repair and door replacement, paint exterior trim on the bell tower and fascia, replace concrete in areas of lower parking lot, audio upgrades, carpet replacement upstairs foyer/hallway (paid by memorial fund), window tinting (already completed), stucco repair by back entrance. Two projects will be brought back to the congregation, at a later date, with firm quotes: boiler replacement and replacing storm windows on stained glass (1/3 of project for current campaign). Thank you to everyone for their participation in the meeting.

CRM software: This project is ongoing; Allan Mortenson and Renée Clifford are working to import data. Positive feedback thus far.

New Business:

Christmas worship scheduled discussed and approved. Friday Christmas Eve (streamed). Saturday Christmas Day (not streamed). Sunday worship. Becky Schneider requests \$200 for bells, Approved. Smoke test with City fire this month-notice received in mail.

The Salvation Army of Jefferson City, Missouri

The benevolence offering for the month of October is the Salvation Army Center of Hope. The Center of Hope is an emergency shelter for homeless men, women, and parents with children. It is the only shelter in the Jefferson City area that accommodates and can house all these groups, including veterans and senior citizens.

The Center of Hope Emergency Shelter provides social services that include a food pantry, clothing vouchers for the Salvation Army Thrift Store, Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners, Christmas assistance for food and toys for families, Christmas and Easter gifts for nursing home residents. Additional services available to help the homeless or near-homeless are the Pathway for Hope Program, rent and utility assistance and a permanent housing program. There are services specifically for children, such as free scouting programs, summer camps, kids choir and Christmas Kids.

The Salvation Army Corps provides Sunday School for all ages on Sunday at 10:00 a.m. and regular worship service on Sunday at 11:00 a.m. Please prayerfully consider giving to this worthy Christian cause.

The Central Region Sharefest was held September 23, 2021 at the Tipton United Methodist Church. Again this year, the event was by drive-through only.

UCC Brotherhood Minutes – September 27, 2021

Refreshments – The meeting started at 7:00 p.m. with a light meal and wonderful desserts provided by Jerry & Verna Wolfrum, assisted by Connie Bestgen.

Business Meeting – Abe Rohrbach called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. The minutes of the July meeting and the August fish fry were read and approved. The treasurer reported a current balance of \$1,500. Steven Burger reported that the church parking lots are in good shape at this time. Abe gave a report on the Prison Project our Brotherhood conducted in cooperation with the Methodist men during the week of September 18-24. Abe provided transportation to and from the Tipton Correctional Center each day for the 10 men involved in the project this year. The group arrived each morning at the Methodist Church at 7:45 a.m. for breakfast, provided by the Methodist men followed by a time of devotion at 8:30 a.m. Devotions included hymn singing, prayer and meditations provided by several ministers. At 9:00 a.m., the men worked with city crews on projects around town. The featured project this year was cleaning brush and trees around the houses north of Phillips Funeral Home on Oak Street. Great lunches were provided each day by volunteers. The men returned to Tipton at 4:00 p.m. each day. On Sunday, they attended the Methodist services and had dinner together, bringing the project to a close. Steven Burger volunteered to have the devotion and Dale Ratcliff volunteered to furnish refreshments for the October meeting. Meeting adjourned.

Devotion – Russell Cobb shared a devotion based on the book, Fathered By God, by John Elldridge. Russell shared that the church was not a big part of his early years. He started attending church with friends while in high school. His parents were loving and caring, but church just wasn't a priority at the time. He enjoyed and appreciated what the church offered him and it became an important part of his life. He read several excerpts from the book that expressed the notion that men need to respond to the wildness of finding spiritual fulfillment. He noted that most of the key events of the Bible took place outside of the church and that we need to find that fulfilling spirituality in times and places that occur in our daily lives. He mentioned the enjoyment he and his Dad get when they go fishing together on a regular basis. There are many things we can do out in nature that can help us develop our masculine spirituality. Russell concluded the devotion with a prayer.

Program - Chase Wyckwood with the Central Missouri Foster Care and Adoption Association presented a program about his agency and the services it provides. The organization is not responsible for placement determinations or approvals, but provides support for foster and adopted children after they are placed. The agency has 32 employees and provides services in 13 counties. Examples of things they provide include providing needed supplies, doing home assessments, giving training to house parents, etc. Basically, they try to fill the gaps in the system to support kids that have had numerous difficulties. The group currently has offices in Columbia, Jefferson City, Rolla and Osage Beach. All of their staff are mandated reporters, meaning that if they observe something that is being detrimental to a child, they are required to report it to proper authorities. He also discussed a kinship program they coordinate, in which children are placed with members of their families or relatives. The agency is planning for an expansion that will basically double their staff and the area they serve.
