Greater Than...

"So he became as much superior to the angels as the name he has inherited is superior to theirs." Hebrews 1:4

I can remember the days of vinyl records, 45s, 8 track tapes, and cassette tapes. In fact I still have a few records and cassettes stored in boxes at our house and here in my office. I remember getting a Walkman so I could listen to my cassettes while I was mowing the yard. I didn't think life could get any better than that. My graduation present from high school was a boom box that played my favorite cassette tapes. It was just within the last few years that this special gift finally quit working. At the time I thought it was the best thing going. But as we have seen in the last 37 years, things have gotten much better in the world of music. What we have now is greater than what we had just a few decades ago.

In November we will take a short look at the book of Hebrews. The theme of Hebrews is that Jesus is greater than anything found in the old ways of the Jewish laws and commandments. He is greater in every way. He is greater than Moses (Hebrews 3:3). He is greater than any high priest (Hebrews 4:14). His covenant and ministry are greater (Hebrews 8:6). Finally his kingdom and promises are greater (Hebrews 12:28). The question is, is Jesus greater than everything in our lives?

Because Jesus is greater than anything in this world, we should be willing to give up everything we have for him, endure any hardship we have for him, and put our faith in action for him. I love Hebrews 10:35, 36 "So do not throw away your confidence; it will be richly rewarded. You need to persevere so that when you have done the will of God, you will receive what he has promised." I highlighted that little phrase that gets overlooked, "when you have done the will of God." How do we know what the will of God is? Seems to be a pretty big question but fairly simple to answer in general: that is what the Bible, prayer, and regular fellowship are for. All of those combined allow the Holy Spirit to guide us into God's will. I encourage you to read the 13 chapters of Hebrews this month and see how you can make Jesus greater in your daily life by regular bible reading, regular prayer and worship.

In November we will honor and remember all of our members that have passed away on Totenfest Sunday, November 21st. Candles will be lit and the bell will be rung in their memories as their names are read. The first Sunday of Advent will be November 28th as we prepare for the Christmas season. November is a special month with so many times of remembrance and thanksgiving.

May God bless each one of you as we serve together in his kingdom.

October 13, 2021 – Consistory Meeting Highlights

The California UCC Consistory met for its regular monthly meeting October 13, 2021. Pastor Cobb opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of the September 2021 meeting, Treasurer's Report, Financial Secretary's Report, Stewardship Snapshot and Local Benevolence Report were reviewed and approved.

Reports and updates were given by committees and organizations. Evangelism planning coverage for fall/winter weddings, New Members Luncheon-Oct 24th. Historical committee: Lexi presented a plan for placement of donated bust, plan approved to add the shelf to rear of sanctuary and relocate the picture. Memorial-nothing new to report. Building and Grounds- in process of requesting multiple bids for HVAC/Boiler. Requesting bid for rear wall (of sanctuary) from several vendors. Audio equipment still delayed with shipping. Safe Church- nothing new to report. Worship- Thank you to Mary Oesterly for preparing communion, suggestion to continue but not to use toothpicks, approved. Advent and special music plans to come. Stewardship- nothing new to report. Brotherhood and Women's Guild continue with monthly meetings. Sunday school picnic was a huge success with 130 people attending. Youth Group meeting—regularly scheduled meetings for the fall.

Pastor Cobb reported on the activities he performed in Sept, 2021: 3 Salem/3 California worship services; 24 DVD deliveries; 24 days at office; 2 Prayer Cells; 1 UCC of California consistory meeting; 4 recordings Time of Hope; 6 office visits; 1 baptism; 1 adoption ceremony; 4 signing birthday cards with Kathy Grant; 1 Ministerial Alliance meeting (First Baptist); 1 Youth Sunday; 24 home/work/nursing home visits; 1 morning devotion at Methodist Church; 3 lunches with work release prisoners and UCC Brotherhood, 1 Men's Brotherhood meeting; 1 Sunday School Meeting; 3 meetings working with HS Students for youth Sunday; 3 confirmation classes; 2 cookie deliveries for new families; 1 community worship service; 10 middle and high school sporting events. Going forward: Sunday ROK started in October with 15 students: potential for 25 known kids.

Pastor Russ looking to focus on discipleship, what it means to disciple and to act. Finding a way to serve, using your abilities.

Old Business:

Audio visual team is training some additional help.

A closer look is needed at the bathrooms under the sanctuary in Fellowship Hall, several issues have been presented.

New Business:

VanDee and Tammy working on the Church Wide Month of Giving to start Oct 30th. Sign up for deep cleaning jobs and additional projects available by the church office. Nominating committee has starting speaking to potential candidates. Tammy Kilmer reports that the Bradford Pear tree in parking lot may need removed, several branches have fallen and cause hazards in the parking lot.

Laura Burger moved to purchase 5 8-foot commercial plastic tables and a large shelving unit for use in ROK and other activities (large gatherings, etc). Allan Mortenson seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Ronnie Kissick moved to get a Sam's Club membership for the church, Alan Chambers seconded the motion. Motion passed. (to be used for supplies, food, etc.)

Note to all who use the Sanctuary, the Eternal Flame should always be on, please ensure it does not get turned off with the lights. Building and Grounds will look to see if anything can be changed to prevent accidentally turning off.


Note 2021 Snapshot regarding Schnuck Endowment

UCC Brotherhood Minutes – October 25, 2021

Refreshments – The meeting began at 7:00 p.m. with a delicious meal of soup and desserts, served by Dale and Carol Ratcliff and enjoyed by all.

Devotion – Steven Burger shared a devotion entitled, "Tax Collectors Have Feelings Too". His comments were based on Romans 13:7 – "Pay all of them their dues, taxes to whom taxes are due, revenue to whom revenue is due, respect to whom respect is due, honor to whom honor is due." Steven noted that governments are imperfect in many ways, but that even the worst of governments is usually better than anarchy. We should always work for better government, remembering that in the end, every nation gets the government it deserves. The government we have is a reflection of the individual citizens it represents, and even though we know there are plenty of flaws in how our government functions and spends money on, we need to honor and support it with our due taxes in the hope that we can continue to enjoy many freedoms we cherish. Obviously, making God a central focus in our lives and in our governing bodies will be the key to an enduring nation of people. Steven concluded his devotion with a prayer.

Business Meeting – Abe Rohrbach called the meeting to order. The minutes of the September meeting were read and approved with a correction in the treasurer's balance. The treasurer's report showed a current balance of \$1408.17 after paying bills for the fish fry, etc. A motion was made and approved to give \$500 to the Central Missouri Foster Care and Adoption Agency for their playground project. The brotherhood agreed to decorate the church at the regular meeting on November 22, with hamburgers and the fixin's when the decorating is done. The group also decided to tentatively schedule Christmas Caroling on Monday, December 20, followed by a chili supper back at church afterward. The group thanked and recognized Tony Barry for a great job of frying fish for the August fish fry. Meeting adjourned.

Program – Larry Rohrbach introduced Marcy Oerly, Moniteau County Assessor, and Ellen Ash, Moniteau County Collector, for a discussion of real estate and personal property taxes in the county. Ellen has been the Collector since 2017 and Marcy has been the Assessor since March, 2020. Marcy noted that the assessor's office operates under the jurisdiction of the Missouri State Tax Commission. The tax commission sets rules and guidelines for the assessment and taxation of real and personal property in Missouri.

Brotherhood Report—continued

The assessor's office is responsible for assessing all real estate and personal property in the county. Real Estate is to be reassessed every other year to bring it up to date with current values. There are currently 10,200 taxed parcels of real estate in Moniteau County. The assessor's office is in the process of making a review of all properties in the county to make sure their records are up to date and correct. Marcy discussed the differences in appraised and assessed values for different types of property, with the example that residential property is assessed at 19% of its appraised value, commercial property at 32%, agricultural land at 12%, etc.

Ellen then outlined the process for collecting the taxes on the property that has been assessed. She receives the assessed property values from the assessor's office in late September. She then receives the various tax levies from all county taxing entities from the county clerk's office. Her job is then to assign the tax levies to each individual property, depending on where the property is located and which tax levies that property owner is responsible for. (for example, school, health dept., road district, fire dept., ambulance service, etc.) They then put together a tax bill for each piece of real estate and a separate bill for items of personal property and send those bills to county property holders for payment by the end of the year. Marcy and Ellen noted that there is a process for appeals if a property holder disagrees with the assessments, and that if it can't be settled within the office, the case can be heard by the county board of equalization. They both indicated that Moniteau County folks have been good to work with and problems with assessments, late payments, etc. are very minimal. Ellen also shared that Moniteau County also receives over \$2 million in taxes from 16 different utilities and railroads each year. She also described the process for disposing of properties that have long term outstanding tax bills. The program was very informative as Marcy and Ellen finished by answering a number of questions from the group.




