G.O.A.T

“Jesus has been found worthy of greater honor than Moses, just as the builder of a house has greater honor than the house itself.”
Hebrews 3:3

The term G.O.A.T. has become a popular term in the sports world in the last decade or so. When you call someone the G.O.A.T., you are not calling them an animal that eats about anything and crawls up on everything that it can. It’s an acronym that stands for “Greatest of All Time.” Sports fans will debate the greatest player of all time in various sports: Michael Jordan in basketball, Tom Brady in football, Jack Nicklaus in golf, and Hank Aaron in baseball have been called the GOATS of their individual sports.

During the summer, we will look at the book of Hebrews which is in the New Testament. There is debate who the writer of Hebrews is. Some say it is the Apostle Paul. Others say it was written by Luke, Barnabas, or Clement. Although there is debate about who wrote Hebrews, there is no debate, who it was written to. It was written to Jewish Christians, who were considering abandoning their faith and going back to their Jewish faith. The writer uses 13 chapters to encourage them not to give up and to convince them that Jesus is the GOAT, greatest of all time. He is greater than Abraham, Melchizedek, and even greater than Moses.

The message on Jesus’ greatness and not giving up resonates with his people and his church today. Our world and our lives seem to be in constant turmoil. It seems God isn’t answering our prayers and that he is far away. It’s easy to get discouraged. Our faith seems stale and listless. We are tempted to chuck it all and try something else to try and makes us happy. Hebrews 10:35-36 is as relevant today as it was 2000 years ago, “So do not throw away your confidence; it will be richly rewarded. You need to persevere so that when you have done the will of God, you will receive what he has promised.”

So don't give up. We have the greatest God. We have the greatest savior, Jesus. We have the greatest power, the Holy Spirit. We have the greatest mission, to serve and love. And finally we have the greatest destination waiting for us, heaven. When we become a Christian, we become the greatest of all time in God's eyes. Hang in there. Share your burden with a fellow brother or sister in Christ and read God's word, especially Hebrews this summer and see why we should never give up on our faith in God.

June 4th is the 175th anniversary of the Salem UCC. That Sunday our worship times will be switched. The UCC of California will worship at 8:30 followed by Sunday School at 9:30. Worship at Salem will start at 10:30 followed by a catered meal in the Salem Fellowship Hall. Several past ministers will be in attendance. It will be a great day of worship and celebration.

May 8, 2023 – Consistory Meeting Highlights

The May meeting of the Consistory was called to order at 6:00pm by President, Laura Burger. Reverend Cobb opened the meeting with prayer. A quorum was established with all members present. The April minutes, the Treasurer's report, the Financial Snapshot, and the Financial Secretary's report were approved.

Correspondence:

The California United Church of Christ has a letter from John Kay, Attorney, stating that in the Last Will and Testament of Lenda Lebeck and her late husband Paul, the Church was shown to be a 10% beneficiary of the net Estate.

A letter was received from our mother church, Salem. They will be celebrating their 175th Birthday on June 4, 2023. The letter invites everyone to come and share their joy.

Building Use Requests:

Three Facility Use Requests were approved.

Committee Reports:

Building and Grounds/Safe Church—Jay Bestgen and Ronnie Kissick

--Ronnie Kissick will reprogram the Handicap door timer.

--The glider chair in the nursery has been repaired.

--The plaque has been hung.

--Hand rails have been installed leading to the choir loft and in the choir room.

--Imhoff Painting started the project to remove the current frames and window covering. They are caulking and painting the area around the windows before the new window protection can be installed.

--The old flooring around the front doors has been removed and repairs made. There is hardwood flooring in that area. A motion passed to restore the hardwood entry on both entrances to the Sanctuary. A strip directly in front of the outside doors will sit on the foundation and be of a material that provides grip for secure footing. The correct type of rug to be used on hardwood floors will be purchased.

--Weathercraft, a company who will inspect the roof tiles and make replacements as needed, submitted a bid of \$4,200.00 that includes time, labor, and tiles for both towers. An additional expense of \$750.00 may also be incurred for security to be sure that the lift stays safe if it needs to be parked in the street as the work is being done. After discussion up to \$5,000.00 was approved for this project.

--There is some landscaping that needs to be done in front of the church where the cedars were removed. The Consistory would appreciate input and help from interested members with the possibility of forming a Landscape Committee in the future.

--A representative of SWC, a security company, met with four consistory members (Jay Bestgen, Laura Burger, Alan Chambers, and Larry Schoenberg) to explore options and discuss costs. Another meeting is planned.

Evangelism--Alan Chambers, Consistory Member

The Committee met and ordered/selected Mother's Day and Father's Day gifts. A second banner has been purchased for the parade float.

Historical--Norman Rohrbach, Committee Chair

As of April 30, 2023, the Committee has met twice. They put out the confirmation display in the cabinet. That display will change to one of active military in the Church. It is hoped that they will have a Historical Moment in the Tidings each month beginning in May.

Schnuck Endowment--Ellen Ash and Laura Burger, Consistory Members

The committee met April 17, 2023. The next meeting will coincide with the next CD maturity.

Stewardship--Larry Schoenberg, Consistory Member

The Committee met April 18, 2023 with another meeting scheduled July 18, 2023. The letter sent to the congregation concerning repairs to the facility in 2023 was discussed.

Worship--VanDee Miller, Consistory Member

The committee met on May 8, 2023. They reviewed the last quarter of worship and were scheduling special music for the summer season.

Sound/Video--Ronnie Kissick, Consistory Member

Ronnie stated that two more volunteers to be in the rotation to run the sound booth are needed.

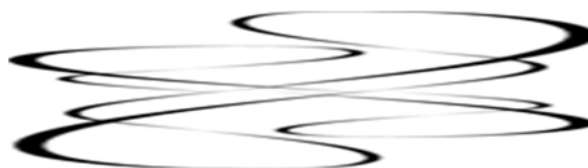

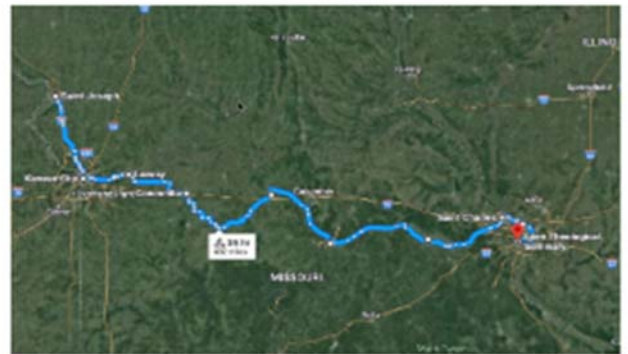

California UCC Historical Highlight

Recently, there have been several articles about renewed interest in restoring tower clocks in courthouses around Missouri. It happens that our own tower clock has been operating since it was installed in our tower in July, 1896, approximately one year after our present church building was completed. The clock was manufactured by Seth Thomas and dated April 30, 1896. The cost of the clockworks and installation was \$380. The city of California donated \$75 toward the purchase and the remainder was made up of donations from church members. With the clock now being 127 years old, a number of church members have wound and maintained the clock through the years. Everett Wilson who owned and operated a funeral home across the street where we now have a parking lot was in charge for a long time. Tony Barry is currently the “winder” and maintainer of the clock and is keeping it well in time and chime. The time mechanism and the chimes are wound separately. The weight that powers the chimes travels from the clock floor to the church basement and has to be wound weekly. The weight box that powers the time mechanism is suspended above the clock works and has to be wound every two weeks. The clock chimes on the hour and half-hour by dropping a hammer on the face of the church bell on the floor below. The clock faces are approximately 5 ½ feet in diameter and there are 71 steps from the vestibule to the clock floor. The clock serves as a steady reminder of our heritage and is a notable landmark in our community. The clock is an amazing piece of machinery and should be good for at least another 127 years!



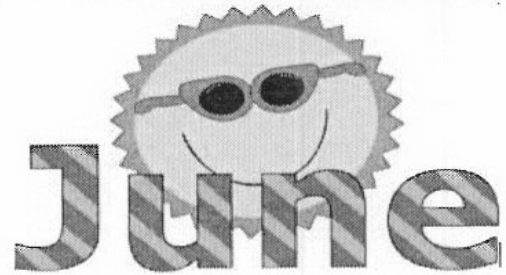

UCC Brotherhood Minutes – Monday May 22, 2023

Refreshments – A delicious meal and desserts were provided by Larry Schoeneberg to begin the meeting. Robert Barbour prayed a blessing over the meal.

Vice President Jerry Wolfrum called the meeting to order at 7:39 PM with 19 members and guests present. The meeting was started with a hymn “When Morning Guilds the Skies.” Abe Rohrbach gave a devotion on Colossians 3:13 “bearing with one another and forgiving one another, if one has a grievance against another; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you must also do,” remarking that grudges make terrible pets, so we should all get rid of our pet grudges.

Program – California Mayor Lanny Ash spoke about the governance of the City of California.

Lanny became Mayor in April after 2 stints totaling nearly 20 years on the Board of Alderman. He decided to run for mayor when former Mayor Rich Green announced that he would not run for re-election last November.

California is a Class 4 city and is one of the few cities of its size that owns its own utilities (electric, water, sewer, and trash). City government is divided into an enterprise side (utilities) and a government side (police, fire, parks, streets). Profits from the enterprise side are used to fund much of the government side, allowing the city budget to be balanced while keeping taxes and fees low. Lanny said that the city is in good financial condition and had high praise for the city’s employees, but highlighted a number of concerns.

Current concerns on the enterprise side include the recent loss of the city’s largest well, that provides about 1 million gallons of water per day to the Cargill plant. To date, the difference has been made up by pumping additionally from the city’s other 4 smaller wells, but this will likely fall short as the summer progresses. The cost of a new well will be approximately \$1.9 million. It is hoped that much of the cost will be paid via an emergency community improvement grant, but the city will still be required to pay approximately \$400,000 in engineering and administrative costs.

Another concern at the water department is older lead-containing pipes, many from the 1940s and 1950s, which supply water to much of city and may require replacement in the near future to comply with state and federal water quality requirements.

A major concern for the city is the need for significant upgrades to the wastewater treatment plant, which is nearing the end of its designed life and has been functioning at and beyond its maximum capacity for a number of years. Costs to the city will range from \$5 million for patches to the current system to \$30 million or more for complete replacement.

On the government side, concerns include new ordinances on food trucks, which come from outside the city with no taxes, licenses, fees, or health inspections and take business away from local establishments.

Business Meeting – The business meeting was called to order at 8:43 PM. Minutes from the April 24 meeting were read and approved.

The group was reminded that some planning will be required to continue the Brotherhood's inmate program in the fall.

It was moved and approved to donate \$500 of Brotherhood funds to the brother of Wilma Bryant, who is undergoing cancer treatment in the Philippines.

Dean Kiesling volunteered to provide refreshments for the June meeting and Rob Barbour volunteered to provide the devotion. Several options were discussed for programs to be presented at the June meeting, and these will be considered by the Program Committee. The speaker for the July meeting will be State Representative Willard Haley, whose district includes all of Moniteau County.

The meeting concluded with a hymn "Now the Day is Over" and adjourned at 9:05 PM with card games following.
