The Fruit of the Spirit

“But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Against such things there is no law.” (Galatians 5:22-23)

My garden is finally starting to look like a garden. With all of the rain and cooler weather during most of the spring, it took a while for my garden to sprout and start to grow. My garden has a variety of veggies in it like okra, zucchini, tomatoes, potatoes, sweet potatoes, beets, green beans, and sweet corn. I also have asparagus, strawberries, raspberries, and blackberries at various corners of my garden. Each one has its own growing season and maturity. We have already picked strawberries, cut asparagus, picked a few raspberries, and Betty dug our first potatoes on Saturday night. I'm still waiting on my zucchini, green beans, and corn. I've had to replant my okra three times and it is finally starting to come up. A garden can represent our spiritual lives.

In Galatians 5, Paul talks about our lives being like a garden and that our lives must produce spiritual fruit as Christians. During July and August we will look at the nine types of spiritual fruit we must produce to be successful Christians. Paul calls it the fruit of the Spirit. Like my garden, each type of spiritual fruit has a different growth rate. Sometimes, you might need to replant a crop and try again. Before I plant any seeds, I have top quality manure spread along with fertilizer and lime. I want the best production possible. I will also spend several hours in the garden managing it so weeds don't take over or that critters don't destroy what I have invested so much time into. It is the same with our spiritual garden. We must nourish it and protect it from invading weeds and destructive critters that want to destroy it. I look forward to preaching through this very familiar and important passage of scripture.

July means summer is in full swing. We'll have the 4th of July parade and start planning for the fair. Our youth will head to camp and many families will take vacations to exciting and beautiful places. I encourage you to watch our online service if you are traveling on Sundays. I always found it exciting to try out churches on vacation. I would look up various ones before we left and then we would make sure to be in church on Sunday morning. You can take advantage of the YouVersion Bible App and read daily devotions on your vacation as well or read a good biblically based book when you get some quiet time on your travels away from home.

California United Church of Christ June 9, 2025 – Consistory Meeting Highlights

The June meeting of the United Church of Christ of California was called to order at 6:00pm by President Carole Barbour. Carole opened the meeting with a prayer. A quorum was established with Carole Barbour, Jay Bestgen, Jim Deeken, Ellen Ash, Larry Schoeneberg, and Kris Ingram present. Anny Roll and Holly Bieri were absent.

The Treasurer's Report was given by Ellen Ash. In the check detail two checks were noted: A check written to Great America Financial for \$499.67 for the monthly lease fee which includes all ink and service calls. Also, a check written to B Safe and Secure for \$204.00 for the quarterly inspections of the facility's security and alarm system.

The Financial Secretary's Report and Stewardship Snapshot were given by Larry Schoeneberg. It was noted income for the month was lower than usual, however expenses remain under control, and the church is in good financial shape overall.

Correspondence included a note expressing gratitude for our participation in the Neon Nights event, specifically mentioning the use of our 9-square set. A heartfelt thank-you note expressing deep appreciation for the card, special message, and gift was received from Letha, our retiring cook. A letter from California Progress, Inc. partnering with the City of California requesting a Letter of Support in their efforts to apply for a grant through MODOT for sidewalk construction starting at California High School and extending toward Village Green Shopping Center. The Consistory discussed the positive impact of this project on community development and student safety and unanimously agreed to provide a Letter of Support for this project on behalf of the church.

Committee Reports

Building and Grounds/Safe Church – Jay Bestgen, Jim Deeken, and Kris Ingram

Lower Entrance Roof Project – Jay Bestgen presented details about extending the roof over the lower entrance doors. The group determined that a double airlock door setup with a smaller canopy overhead would better meet space constraints and functional needs. Jay will proceed with developing a project scope and gathering images for reference.

LED Sign – Kris Ingram provided information on potential LED signage solutions. Double-sided signs: Approximately \$40,000, installed with warranty. Single-sided signs: Approximately \$29,000, installed with warranty.

Youth Group – Kris Ingram

Kris reported that fundraising efforts for a youth mission trip have been outstandingly successful. They raised \$400 from concessions and \$3923.75 from the two-week garage sale. The youth group continues to meet on Wednesday evenings throughout the summer for Bible studies at the Ingram's home.

Old Business

Financial Review Committee – The 2024 Financial Review Committee report was received via email on 5/19 and was filed.

New Business

Service Music – The Consistory explored ways to ensure seamless transitions when Beth Dampf, the regular organist, is unavailable.

Sound Booth – So far, one person is on board to be trained. The Tech Team is still looking for a couple more volunteers to join the team.

Consistory Highlights continued....

Nursery Attendant – Kya Peck will be resigning as nursery attendant.

Wednesday Night Meals – Meals will start up again on Wednesday, September 3rd and Patrick Miller will be cooking.

Church Directory – The Evangelism Committee is preparing to organize plans for a new church directory.

Scholarship History – The Consistory was provided with a detailed history of the scholarship program offered by the church to high school seniors who are members of the United Church of Christ. This document outlines the origins of the scholarship fund by the Kaiser, Albertine and Sperber families, along with other donations throughout the years. As of 2025, the church has awarded approximately \$60,272.50 in scholarships given to 153 graduating seniors. The updated scholarship application was approved and now includes a question regarding involvement in the local church.

Special Benevolence—July

RAPE & ABUSE CRISIS SERVICE (RACS)

The special benevolent mission project for July is the Rape and Abuse Crisis Service (RACS). RACS is a non-shelter, social service agency providing crisis intervention, advocacy, support and education/prevention services to victims/survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence and stalking. **RACS** began its mission in early 1980 by establishing a 24-hour crisis hotline to offer emotional support and referral information to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. Nine central Missouri counties are served by RACS including Cole, Gasconade, Maries, Miller, Moniteau, Morgan, Osage, Southern Boone and Southern Callaway. The agency continues to evaluate the services provided in order to more effectively address victims' needs. Services have gradually expanded as needs and funding for this not-for-profit agency have increased. The services they provide are free of charge to people who have been victims. They also provide education and prevention programs to end personal violence in our society. Providing victims with the opportunity to regain confidence, control and direction in their lives helps keep this community strong. Please give to the important mission in the attached envelope.

Plans were finalized for the Vacation Bible School fish fry on Thursday, June 26. It was moved and approved that the Brotherhood will purchase the fish for the meal. Tony Barry will lead the cooking starting at around 4:00 with the meal to be served at around 6:30.

Plans were also discussed for the Brotherhood fish fry in August. It was moved and approved that the fish fry will be held in lieu of the August meeting, that the men's group from Central Church in Jefferson City will be invited to attend, and a speaker of interest to both groups will be arranged.

The Brotherhood will again support the inmate ministry, with Rob Barbour leading UCC California's efforts. The First Christian Church and Methodist Church will be invited to the July 28 Brotherhood meeting to kick off this year's ministry.

The next Brotherhood meeting will be held July 28. The program will feature former First Baptist pastor Greg Morrow. Norman Rohrbach will give the devotion, and Rob Barbour will provide refreshments.

The business meeting adjourned at 8:19 PM.

Program – Ryan Bell of the Lone Elm Lutheran School spoke about the school. Ryan grew up in the small village of Lone Elm, Missouri near Bunceton. He attended Mizzou, served in the Army, and settled in Columbia. When he had children, he moved back to his family farm in Lone Elm. His children now attend the same 2-room school in Lone Elm he attended as a child.

The school has been in continuous operation since 1896. It is a parochial school associated with Zion Lutheran Church. It employs a strongly Christian curriculum, which it receives from Pensacola Christian College. The school day also features daily prayer, reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, and chapel services. The school has 2 teachers, one teaching Grades 1-4 and one teaching Grades 5-8, although the distribution of grades can vary according to enrollment. The school also has a part-time physical education teacher, a volunteer teacher's aide, and a part-time bus driver. The school is funded partially by the Lutheran Church and partially by student tuition, as well as by extensive fundraising efforts. Parent volunteers serve all administrative and staff functions.




The goal of the store is to help local kids to feel good about growing up in a rural community.

Meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m.




Cressida moved to adjourn the meeting, Lauren seconded.

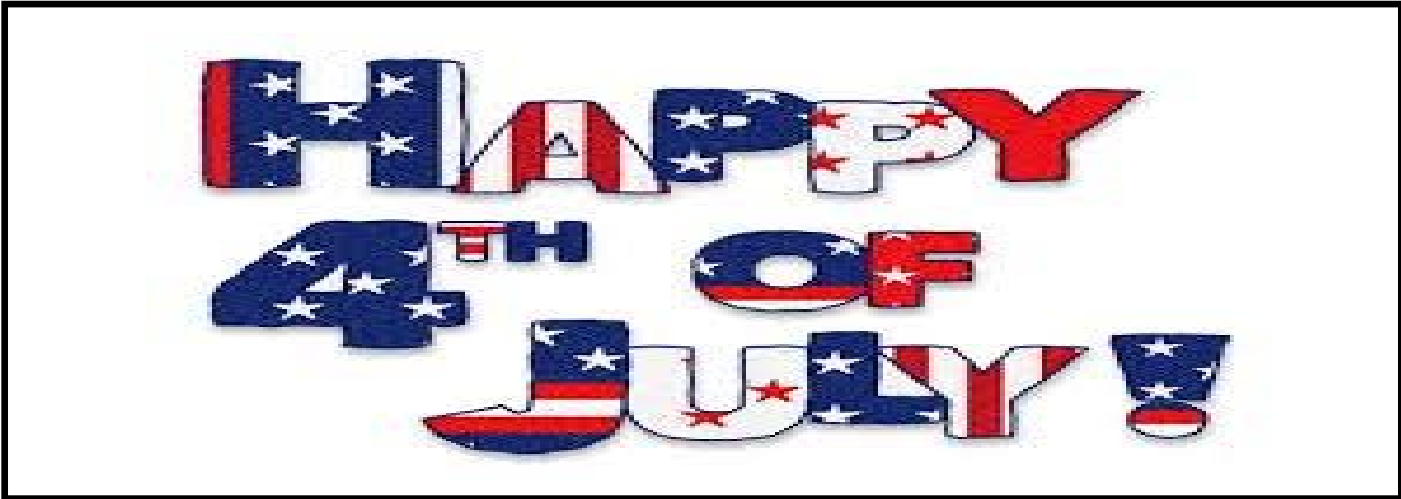

Did you Know?

The Edward C. Kaiser Memorial Scholarship was established in April 1989 with the original amount of \$16,000 by Lucille (Jahn) Goldammer and brother, Herbert F. Jahn who were cousins to Ed Kaiser. The interest earned from the original CD was to be used to distribute the scholarship funds to graduating seniors who provided proof of continuing their education at an institution of higher learning. The amounts varied based on the interest and number of applicants.

In 2005, the interest alone was not enough to fund the scholarships so a special offering was taken and thus a second scholarship fund, The United Church of Christ Scholarship Fund was established. Monies from the Albertine and Sperber families, along with other donations throughout the years, continue to provide scholarships each year for seniors who are members of the United Church of Christ.

As of 2025, approximately \$60,272.50 has been awarded to 153 seniors.

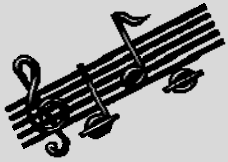

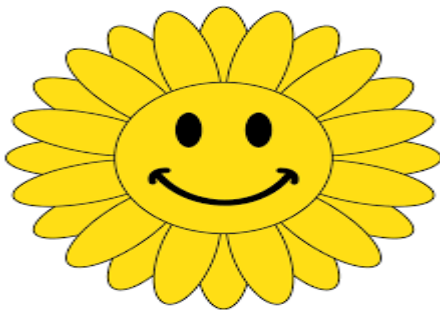

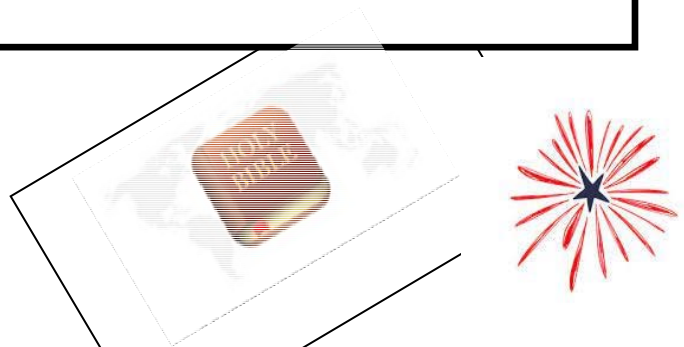
